Switching on the Radio

In my last job as Chaplain to Southampton Solent University I used to arrange an annual chaplaincy lecture. One year we had Richard Harries, who was Bishop of Oxford at the time and the lecture theatre was full. A number of the people there were not Christian but they had heard him on the radio and in particular BBC 4's Thought for the Day that is broadcast at 7.45am. Someone said to me that although he wasn't religious he enjoyed listening to Richard Harries and he was one of the few religious broadcasters that didn't make him want to pick up his radio and throw it out of the window.

Thought for the Day certainly has its critics. John Humphrys, one of the presenters on the Today Programme describes it as often "deeply boring," and he added: "When you're presenting [Today], how many times have you said to yourself, 'Dear God, we've got to cut a really fascinating programme short because we're now going to hear somebody tell us that Jesus was really nice, and the world could be a better place if we all ...' You know ... Oh God." Defenders of the short slot in the morning make the case that it covers all traditions and faiths. There is a great diversity in its message and by and large it is greatly appreciated. According to the BBC there are no plans to have it removed from the schedule and the point was made that "religion is robust enough to withstand challenges." I imagine that the objection is that why shouldn't an atheist or humanist viewpoint be treated the same as a religious opinion. We live in a society where according to recent surveys over half the population is not religious. Maybe also there is a sense that religion is bound up with telling people what they should be doing and how they should be living.

From a personal perspective I don't see faith as about commandments and rules, but more about invitation and

promises. The Church of England is celebrating Christmas this year under the logo "God with us: The constant refrain of Christmas, in carols and readings, is that God is with us. In whatever situations you find yourself this Christmas, God is with you - you need only turn to him and ask to know his presence." There will be a number of different services taking place at St Mary's and these are advertised in the newsletter. Please do come along and I hope that you will not find them to quote John Humphrys "deeply boring," but rather an invitation to see things from a different perspective. Rather than telling people how to live, it can be in my experience, finding something that at one level you already know. Please do come along and you will be made very welcome.

How do you 'grab a tower'?

After all, you can't even get your arms round it!

If you collect stamps, you stick them in an album. Ringers 'grab a tower' by ringing there, in company with other ringers, not just doing a solo! Then they record their visit in a book known as '*Dove*'. And that's what about 3 dozen ringers did at the end of October. Each paid for the privilege, and over £600 was raised towards the restoration of bells in Hertfordshire.

23 churches at our end of the county were scheduled to be open for ringing for up to an hour, in sequence, throughout the day. Northchurch was the 4th tower on and our first visitors came from the list, Northamptonshire, particularly wanting to ring at St Mary's. Other ringers came from Yorkshire (in a minibus), Lancashire, Worcester, Canterbury - and Hemel Hempstead! - to ring at as many towers as they could. Such visitors are amongst the most addicted ringers and invariably pretty expert. If you heard them that morning, you would have heard some good ringing. There are around 6,000 towers in the British Isles and two of my ringing friends have rung at nearly all of them – fewer than 10 still to go!

Another kind of addition for ringers is the scoring of quarter peals (50 minutes of ringing non-stop). At Northchurch, there is an average of 13 successful QPs each year. (Just a few 'fall apart' before they reach the end and they don't count.) In the middle of November, you may have heard local ringers making attempts at any of the local towers during our annual Quarter Peal Weekend. Some of the participants attempted their first ever quarter; others added a few to the hundreds they have already rung! I'm a little nearer my first hundred

For the 70th Wedding Anniversary of H.M. the Queen and Prince Philip, the bells were 'fired' during our usual practice on 20th November. At the end of November, St Mary's bells celebrated a 90th birthday. Bill Frew was born before the two 'youngest' bells were installed in the tower; and he still lends his rich bass voice to harmonies in the choir Sunday by Sunday.

<u>Gunner 294266 Alfred CURL</u> Royal Garrison Artillery Died 29th December 1917

Alfred Curl was born in Northchurch in 1892. After leaving school Alfred started work as a carter at East's Timber Yard in Gossoms End but then moved to York where he worked at one of the city's chocolate manufacturers. Alfred married Beatrice Rogers there just before he enlisted with 144th (York) Heavy Battery, Royal Garrison Artillery.

The 144th had two sections equipped with a pair of five-ton 60-pdr guns, requiring a team of eight horses or a caterpillar tractor to move each one. It arrived in France in June 1916 in time for the Somme Offensive. The following year 144th supported the troops during the Third Battle of Ypres, frequently coming under artillery and gas shells fired by the Germans.

In October 1917, the battery took part in the Battle of Cambria, the first massed attack on the German lines using tanks with artillery and Royal Flying Corps aircraft in support. The initial attack was a complete success, but it was not followed up, and the momentum was lost. The Germans slowly recaptured much of the ground it has previously lost. With winter closing in, in mid-December the British forces went onto the defensive and faced the constant danger of artillery fire. Around 27th December, Alfred Curl was seriously wounded by shellfire and transferred to 55 Casualty Clearing Station at Tincourt, five miles east of Peronne. He died there of his injuries on 29th December, aged 25. Alfred's body now lies at the Tincourt New British Cemetery.

Private 48065 Frank Francis (ALLAWAY) 5th Battalion, Bedfordshire Regiment Killed 31st December 1917

Frank Francis Allaway, was born near Oxford in early 1878. When Frank was very small, the family moved to Hemel Hempstead and later Abbots Langley. In 1900 Frank left home and moved to Maidenhead where he married Annie Shail, and two years later they had a daughter. The 1911 Census records Frank and his family living in Paddington, but the events of the next few years are unclear as Frank subsequently moved to Northchurch living on his own and using the name Frank Francis. Frank found employment as a timber sawyer and gas engine attendant with Henry & James Matthews, a Berkhamsted builder and undertaker in Castle Street. He also became an active member of the Berkhamsted and Northchurch Fire Brigade.

In 1917 Frank was conscripted and posted to $1/5^{th}$ Battalion, Bedfordshire Regiment. In little more than a

month after his enlistment, Frank crossed to France with a draft of conscripts for 1/5th Battalion. They traversed France by rail to Marseilles, where at the beginning of December 1917, some 2,200 soldiers, including Frank, 150 officers and 160 nursing sisters boarded the *Aragon* en route to various units in Egypt.

At that time crossing the

Mediterranean to Egypt was becoming increasingly dangerous as Austrian and German submarines were inflicting substantial losses, and a convoy system had to be introduced. On 30th December, the *Aragon*, supported by the destroyer HMS *Attack* was approaching the Egyptian coast when a lurking Austrian submarine launched its attack. *Aragon* was hit and began evacuating the troops on board, many being transferred successfully to HMS *Attack*. Suddenly *Attack* exploded, it had been hit by another torpedo from the Austrian submarine.

Frank Francis Allaway, 590 other soldiers, and most of *Aragon's* crew, died. Were it not for the many trawlers that rushed to the scene, this death toll would have been far higher. Of the twenty-five 1/5th Bedfordshire Regiment men who died, only the body of their Quarter Master Sergeant Major was ever recovered for burial.

Private 235328 Harold Alfred SHRIMPTON 20th Battalion, Kings (Liverpool Regiment) Died 13th January 1918

Harold Shrimpton was born in 1884 at Great Hasely in Oxfordshire. Harold eventually moved to Berkhamsted and started work at the local Co-operative Society as a grocer. Soon afterwards he married Selina Holloway and they settled at 57 Gossoms End. Harold eventually became Manager of the Co-op's Provident Place branch.

In 1916 Harold received his conscription papers and having had his appeal refused he reported to the Army Recruiting Centre at Watford. Following his training he was picked for specialist work as a Lewis machine-gunner.

Harold took part in the Third Battle of Ypres in the wet autumn of 1917, and was still in the area in January 1918 when he was part of a patrol sent out to spy on new German trenches. Harold was subsequently wounded and rushed to a Casualty Clearing Station where he died on 13th January aged 31. Harold's body now lies in the Outtersteene Cemetery, near Bailleul.
