

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

Introduction

St Mary's Northchurch is one of the oldest churches in Hertfordshire and situated on the A4251 Northchurch High Street. At weekends, the church has the use of the adjacent playground of St Mary's Northchurch Primary School for car parking, access to which is off New Road.

St Mary's is linked with St Bartholomew's church in Wigginton to form a United Benefice. Once a month we hold a combined evening service at one of the churches.

Aims and Purposes

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) is a body corporate governed by the PCC Powers Measure 1956 and Church Representation Rules 2011.

The principle aims of the PCC are to serve the local community by:

- Providing a full programme of public Christian worship
- Teaching the Christian faith
- Encouraging and enabling the local community to worship at the church and become members of the church community
- Providing appropriate pastoral care within the local community
- Promoting whole pastoral, evangelistic, ecumenical and social missions of the Church of England

The PCC is also responsible for the maintenance of the church, the parish rooms and 98 High Street.

The PCC is a Public Benefit Entity within the meaning of Financial Reporting Standard 102, and it has regard for the Charity for the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit and in particular the specific guidance on the advancement of religion.

The PCC believes that during the year it has complied with the duty under Section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016 (duty to have due regard to House of Bishops' guidance on safeguarding children and vulnerable adults).

Following the implementation of the General Data Protection Regulation in May 2018 the PCC approved a new Privacy Notice which is available via the church website.

The PCC met six times during the year and the Standing Committee met twice. During the year, a number of sub-committees were formed to deal with specific aspects of church life, with the sub-committees reporting back to the main body of the PCC. The new sub-committees include a Finance Committee, a Fabric Committee and a Social Committee. A Standing Committee consisting of the Incumbent, Church Wardens, Treasurer and Secretary deals with urgent items which arise between the scheduled PCC meetings.

Achievements and Performance

2018-2019 has been a particularly busy and eventful year in the life of St Mary's church, which has kept the church at the centre of village life.

Currently we have scaffolding surrounding the church. Anyone living in the village for some time will no doubt be aware that for at least five years we have been fundraising to replace the leaking lead covering on the church roof with a new covering of terne-coated steel. We have now raised sufficient money, which together with legacies has enabled this long-overdue work to start. Work will be completed by Easter.

During the year, we have held a social event most months, ranging from a "Call my Quaff" quiz game in March to a soup kitchen in May in aid of Christian Aid. We had hot cross buns on Good Friday, an Easter egg hunt on Easter Saturday, then a sausage sizzler for St George's day in April. Terry Waite gave the Deanery Lecture in May, then June saw us embarking on a coach trip to Hereford cathedral in conjunction with our sister-church in Wigginton. During the build-up to the annual church fête there was a general tidy-up of the churchyard and surrounding area. The fête raised funds for three charities, the roof fund together with a local charity and an overseas mission. July also saw us enjoying cream teas in the Rectory garden entertained by The *Gillybillies* and a singer's workshop and evening entertainment in the church. During August, the Parish Room paintwork was redone, along with a deep clean of the chairs and radiator grills.

The sponsored Bike 'n Hike cycle ride, organised by the Beds & Herts Historic Churches Trust during September, was followed by the Harvest supper and quiz and the Happy Wanderers tea in October, the Christmas bazaar in November and the annual Crisis at Christmas lunch in December. In January we held a traditional Burns Night Supper, where we had a great deal of fun singing and dancing as well as enjoying a hearty meal together. February saw our very own missionary, Claire Hodgson, return for a month to update us on her work in the Dominican Republic, followed by a roast dinner and a question-and-answer session about her life and work.

On Wednesday afternoons, between March and October, we have had the church open every week for companionship, tea, coffee and cake. Once the work on the new roof is complete we aim to have the church open on a daily basis during daytime hours. With this in mind, security cameras and further security equipment were installed inside the church. The clock and organ have been maintained and a music festival is being planned for July.

The Christmas services were well attended this year. Sunday clubs run most Sundays for the younger members of the congregation, and toys are provided in the Lady Chapel for younger children who are too young for Sunday club. For older children, the Friday night sessions have been restored for the *Lighthouse* youth group.

The redesigned church website www.stmarysnorthchurch.org.uk has reached wider into the local community which, together with the church's Facebook page, has kept the local and wider communities updated on events and activities at St Mary's.

During the year at St Mary's there were 5 weddings, 1 Blessing, 9 funerals, 2 memorial services, 18 baptisms and 12 burial of ashes.

A new Electoral Roll came into force on 7th April 2019 and contains 125 names.

Financial Report 2018

Summary:

I am pleased to be able to report that 2018 was a good year financially for St. Mary's, with a total surplus of £21,985, income over expenditure, at year end. Our parish share was, once again, paid in full and on time and due to the continued hard work of the fundraising teams and others we were, as the year drew to a close, able to look forward to commencing the work on the church roof.

Income:

2018 saw an increase in voluntary Income of over 20% due, in the main, to an increase in donation and legacy income. Following a couple of years of reduction in planned giving, ie monies given by standing order and the regular envelopes scheme it is encouraging to see this increasing by almost 6% during 2018.

Events and Activities income was once again strong and the efforts of the fete committee, as well as Jill and Emily's contributions on the magazine advertising and parish room bookings respectively, are owed thanks for this.

Whilst the total of "other income" was down on the previous year this was, in the main, due to the reduction in roof fund income as we neared our target. We did, however, see a significant increase in rental income on 98 High Street as we were able to secure tenants following the works completed last year.

Expenditure:

As in previous years, the largest expenditure for 2018 was the Parish share paid to the Diocese which amounted to £53,286. Charitable giving increased as did the fees paid to the Diocese for weddings and funerals as we saw an increase in these events.

There appears to be an increase of almost 36% in church running costs, but we did receive a significant refund from our previous supplier of gas, so the actual increase is closer to 16% which, whilst still significant, is not a cause for concern.

Going Forward:

The roof work has begun in earnest and we know that over the coming months expenditure is sure to exceed income significantly. Hopefully 2019 will bring a continued increase in planned giving and I am sure that the fundraising efforts will continue too. This should ensure that our cashflow allows us to continue to support charities and foundations in both the UK and abroad as well as supporting our church and allowing us to pay our parish share.

I could not fulfil my role without the continued support and assistance of other members of the PCC and the congregation and I am especially grateful to Nick and Gill Bugg.

Respective responsibilities of the Trustees and Independent Examiner

Basis of Independent Examiner's Statement

My examination was carries out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from the management committee concerning such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in a full audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the accounts.

Independent Examiner's Statement

In connection with my examination, no matters have come to my attention.

CHURCHWARDENS' REPORT

2018-2019 has been a particularly busy and eventful year in the life of St Mary's church, but we would like to begin our report by thanking the clergy team, Jonathan, Michael, Doreen, Peggy and David for their hard work, love and dedication to our Northchurch community. We greatly appreciate their input to village, church and community life. We would also like to thank Rachel for her leadership of the music group and for being so wonderfully welcoming to all comers in her garden for the church fête, as well as other church and village social events. The musical life of the church continues apace, with many thanks to our organist and choir leader Jenny Hoare. We welcome Peach Berry as our youth leader.

Most of you will, by now, have noticed the scaffolding all around the church. If you have lived in the village for more than a few weeks you will no doubt be aware that we have been fundraising to raise the money to replace the leaking lead covering on the church roof for at least five years. We thank you and the school community for your forbearance in what has been a rather messy job, which should be completed by the end of the Easter school holidays.

There have been a great number of exciting events laid on by various members of the church community to achieve our goal and it has been a very great privilege to be involved in this monumental achievement for our beautiful grade 1 listed building. From fundraising to liaising with the architect and roofers, organising a bat survey, and engaging an archaeologist to supervise the work and log and record anything of interest which was uncovered when the old lead has been taken off, it has been an interesting experience, which is not likely to be repeated within any of our lifetimes as the new terne-coated steel roof, should last many years. It has the great advantage that it is not easily removed and has no market value to thieves who have stolen roofing lead from many of our neighbouring churches. So many people have contributed to the fundraising by buying "bricks" or roofing tiles, bells for tower etc towards the wonderful scale model made by Andrew Dobbie that many thousands of pounds have been raised. If you have not seen the model, be sure to come to the ACM, when it will be on display.

If you would like to come to any future events please do check the website regularly and read the Parish magazine and pew sheets to find out what we are planning so that you can come and join in. You will be very welcome. Remember, the church is part of your heritage and a vital asset to our community.

In the last year we have had a social event most months, ranging from a "Call my Quaff" quiz game in March to a soup kitchen in May in aid of Christian Aid. <u>Fabric</u>

There has been a focus this year on trying to maintain and preserve the grounds and buildings without much expense as the main focus has been on saving up for the roof work, but a few jobs have been completed, including tidying grounds and hedge trimming. Fallen trees have been removed and new fencing has been installed round the steps and doorway to the boiler house. The grass has been cut regularly.

Security cameras and further security equipment have been installed inside the church. The clock and organ have been maintained. We are delighted to report that the Diocese was persuaded to help us with the cost of repairing some very substantial potholes in Rectory Drive, making that safer for people to walk to the Parish rooms and to school.

It is hoped to move towards our Mission Action Plan of having the church open as soon as the roof work has been completed.

Mission Action Plan

The organ has been securely covered in order to prevent ingress of dirt from the roof whilst it is being repaired. Permission has been given by the Venerable Jonathan Smith, Archdeacon of St Albans, for the solenoids to be replaced as those which were installed 20 years ago are showing signs of wear and tear and cannot be relied upon to work properly. When this work has been done, Jenny Hoare has plans to arrange a music festival in July. Visiting organists will be invited to play.

The Christmas services were well attended this year. Sunday clubs run most Sundays for the younger members of the congregation, and toys are provided in the Lady Chapel for younger children who are too young for Sunday club. Friday night sessions have been restored for the *Lighthouse* youth group under the leadership of Peach Berry and the Sears and Hodgsons have started to refurbish the loft for their use. This will include some fire-retardant seating and some computer games. If anyone has a spare large screen television which is in good working order that could be used for games, please let Peach know.

Lastly, please accept our thanks for everything that you do for the church and the church community. There are so many people who beaver away behind the scenes, never asking for praise or glory, but without whom this church would be a much poorer place. If you have a talent or a skill that you would like share with us, whether it be baking a cake for the church fête, polishing brasses, cutting the grass, or trimming the yew hedge, please do get in touch via the website or in person on a Sunday morning after the ten o'clock service.

CHILDREN'S CLUB & CRECHE

A feature of Sunday Club over the last year or so has been the fluctuating numbers - some weeks we can have just one or two children, other weeks we can have ten or more. YOUTH WORK

For the Lighthouse youth team, this year has consolidated many of the foundations set up over the last ten years within the youth work. It has been a year of many blessings and fulfilled hopes.

In September, Robert Pain returned to university, leaving questions over how the Lighthouse youth ministry would continue. I, together with a team of amazing people met to pray and discuss what a future vision for the Lighthouse ministry would look like, given that it was no longer possible to afford a youth minister (part-time or full-time). Hence, a Youth framework was put together that gave structure and purpose to the youth work, in a way that would enable it to continue in years to come. A large part of this is to invest in our youth for the future, so that as they find a sense of belonging within the Lighthouse youth group, they will be able to instil in those children coming up through the Sunday school a sense of what it is to have a faith, as well as a place to call 'church', within the wider St. Mary's church community. As a result of this framework, I and a small team set about prioritising what we could provide in terms of weekly meetings, activities and events. The Lighthouse youth now meets every Friday. We have about ten young people who regularly attend, ranging from year 7 to year 13. Last term, the programme included an hour of 'chill' and chat, followed by an hour of Bible study/group discussion. This term the programme includes guest speakers coming in to share their life journeys from spiritual and testimonial angles. Each week, the young people and team have built on relationships and fun and it is clear that we have a bunch of inspiring young people.

As our youth continue to mature spiritually, we will seek to develop the Lighthouse Youth framework and programme, in order to further the spiritual journeys of our young people.

I am so grateful for the support of Jonathan Gordon, the PCC, the Smoult Trust and members of our church (Andrea, Penny, Nick, Sarah, James, Rachel to name a few) and it is so good to be able to provide a youth group for our inspiring youth.

While we have not recruited new singers, we are delighted that Gareth is back with us, singing, directing the choir and playing the organ – a most able and willing deputy and a great encourager within the choir.

Members of the choir have contributed at the sung Eucharists, but also played a full part at major festivals during the year and worked extremely hard to produce lovely performances of 'O radiant dawn' at the Advent carol service and 'Mater ora filium' at Christmas. The

ladies seemed to particularly enjoy the Christmas descants. Several of the choir also sang at weddings in St Mary's and St Bartholomew's in Wigginton and also at special services in Ashridge chapel.

The choir is not robed and we don't process, but we do take pride in what we do. We welcome 'enquirers' to our rehearsals – do come and give us a try. Although it can help if you read music, there are plenty of ways of learning and you are assured of a warm welcome. The door is open - (via south transept – Friday 6.30pm)

STEWARDSHIP SCHEME

Have you considered updating your way of financially contributing to the Church recently? Are you still finding cash to put in, when the plate comes round during services? There are ways we can make it more convenient for your situation.

A declared commitment to making your donations Gift Aided, is preferable to make sure we can reclaim the maximum Gift Aid on your donations. Whichever way you choose to donate, there are four donation methods available, as shown below.

Standing Order

This is the ideal way as it allows the Stewardship Secretary and Treasurer to see exactly what amount they can guarantee will be donated. This can be used with or without having signed a Gift Aid declaration. To initiate this there is a form on the back of the last pew.

Weekly Stewardship Scheme (Boxed Brown Numbered Envelopes)

This envelope has a number assigned to you and dated for each Sunday throughout the year for you to put your cash/cheque in and which you can put into the collection plate during the service. The scheme includes committing to a financial value which you are able to afford. It can be used with or without having signed a Gift Aid declaration.

White Envelope Scheme

This envelope has been provided for those who wish to contribute cash of whatever value, on a regular basis (if not weekly) who don't want to fill in the Blue Gift Aid envelopes every time they attend. An individual scheme number is assigned upon starting this scheme.

Gift Aid Envelopes (Blue Un-numbered Envelopes)

These are found at the end of the pews and are specifically there for income tax payers wishing to contribute cash to the collection. THERE IS NO POINT IN USING THEM WITHOUT SIGNING THE DECLARATION AND PROVIDING YOUR ADDRESS.

In the church we hosted our second very successful "Puzzlefest", a vast and amazing display of puzzles which were ready to buy. Many visitors came to browse and buy whilst listening to organ recitals and beautiful songs sung by Madalena Tudorian accompanied on the piano by Roger Bowley.

The Hemel Brass Band entertained visitors with popular tunes and during the break "Shrimpy" from EastEnders and his band put on a performance.

RAISE THE ROOF CAMPAIGN

When we started fundraising in October 2015 we never imagined that three years later we would have achieved so much. We would like to thank everyone involved for their generous gifts of time and money that made it possible that we could start with the work on our roof at the beginning of this year.

During 2018 contributions to the roof fund were made through the Bike 'n' Hike sponsored rides and a third of the funds raised at the summer fete went towards the roof fund. Various social events including a Call My Quaff evening, the Christmas Bazaar and Scottish Dancing were very much enjoyed by the church community and raised additional funds.

Andrew still plans to furnish the interior of the model church to encourage continued donations for the roof and the organ. From April 2018 to February 2019 a further £8,500 was raised by the model. A kind sponsor paid for the printing of 1000 Christmas cards picturing the model of the church the sale of which raised a further £500, and half of them are left over to sell this Christmas.

In total during the year nearly £13,000 was raised which will help to pay for our new roof, which – if everything goes to plan - we will be able to enjoy by the time you are reading this report.

However, fundraising will have to continue for the foreseeable future to cover the balance of the cost for the roof and also to pay for the urgently needed repairs to the organ, which can be started as soon as the roof has been completed.

BELLRINGERS

St Mary's is blessed with a fine sounding peal of eight bells – and an amiable band of bellringers. We are committed to ringing the bells for Sunday services and on other special occasions such as weddings. Only rarely will you hear fewer than six bells and we may even have 10 ringers who have to take turns on Sundays.

Our average age would be lower if our youngest ringer were not at University, but climbing the stairs to the ringing room helps to keep us all fit! Some of us are more expert than others, but we combine to make a good team – and we are all still learning to develop our skills. Two of our number have gained accreditation from the Association of Ringing Teachers.

At the time of writing, a Northchurch learner is being taught by a ringer from another tower so that he can gain his teaching qualification. This kind of mutual support is characteristic of bellringing. We welcome ringers from other towers to our practice nights on a Monday, and several of us attend practices at other towers during the week. We gain when our visitors are experienced – and we happily share our expertise with more novice ringers.

Revd Jonathan encourages our hospitality by generously permitting other bands of ringers to use 'his' bells. Members of the 'local bell club' attempt quarter peals every second Monday and regular friends from Hatfield and St Albans also treat the community to some quality ringing. A highlight of the year was hosting ringers from across the County at their Annual General Meeting when the guest was one of the County Association's patrons. The Very Revd the Dean of St Albans, Jeffrey John, gave the address and led the intercessions in our service of Evening Prayer, stayed for tea and opened the formal business meeting. Once a year, the local bell club association holds its monthly meeting at St Mary's when thirty or more ringers take turns on the bells.

It is true that bellringers are heard rather than seen, but half of St Mary's band do attend church and 5 of them deliver newsletters. All of them give service to the church and the community. I thank them for their continuing support and friendliness; and my thanks are also extended to members of the congregation who count the bells each Sunday, or tell me they open their windows the better to hear the bells!

ST MARY'S PLAYGROUP

The team that ran St Mary's Playgroup chose to close in July 2017. Heidi Baker & Sarah Hubbard (both childminders) took on the Playgroup in Sept 2017 and it became part of the church, no longer an independent group. As childminders, we are both independently DBS checked & both hold a 12hr Paediatric First Aid Certificate. Children are not left at the playgroup, they will always attend with a parent or guardian, but we are insured and have up to date risk assessments in place. Certificates are on display inside our cupboard space in the main hall.

The playgroup meets on a Tuesday morning 09.30 - 11.30 term time only in the Parish Rooms and it is open to all. We offer tea, coffee and biscuits for a small fee per family, along with a craft each week and toys a-plenty! We often use the school holidays to meet and clean our resources, recycling where we can and ensuring all are safe.

The Playgroup is run as a non-profit making group, where we invest the monies taken back into the weekly craft and refreshments for those attending. We keep a record of our accounts, income & expenditure each week, but do not have a bank account, as we just deal in cash.

We like to mark the end of each school term with a special activity. We have had a soft play visit us; we have enjoyed the Summer in the rectory garden with sand and water play and also had a Christmas party including full lunch and presents. We supported the Church Summer Fair with having the sand and water out, with no charge and plan to do the same again this year.

We have now joined resources with the Berkhamsted Under-5s Group and share as much as we can, in a bid to save space. Each group now has access to the toy cupboards in both the main room and those stored in the Lockhart Room. It is working really well and resources are being updated all the time for the small people in our community. The resources can be

made available for anybody who would like to use them; though we are unable to leave the cupboards unlocked, as we could not risk children accessing the toys themselves, as the cupboards are full and are a potential health and safety risk that we could not cover by insurance without adult supervision.

We could not run it on our own and many people help and support us each week, with Barbara Gilkes coming in to do the coffee every Tuesday morning & Jonathan always coming to say hello to the children and often joining them in their craft too.

The group has grown and we have lots of regular visitors and some that come occasionally, which is lovely. It is an inclusive group; please share this with anybody you think may wish to come along.

THE CHARITY OF DR SMOULT

The title may sound old-fashioned, but this Charity is right up-to-date. 300 years ago, it gave grants towards apprentices; nowadays both boys and girls may receive financial help towards a wide range of educational activities. Way back, only residents of the Parish of Northchurch could benefit; today the Charity's area of operation covers the United Benefice and the Chiltern Park Estate. Young people active in either St Mary's or in St Bartholomew's may apply even if they live outside the specified area.

Dr Smoult's fund has been carefully husbanded over the years and its capital is spread over a range of investments. Every year, the Trustees receive independent advice on their investments, and monies may be moved in order to increase the Charity's income with acceptable risk. It is the income, not the capital, from which the Trustees make grants for educational purposes. During 2018, the Trustees distributed grants totalling £27,100 to individuals, schools and youth groups

ST MARY'S SCHOOL

The past year at St. Mary's has continued to flourish with a record number of 150 families choosing to send their children to school here.

We were delighted that 87% of children leaving the Reception class achieved a good level of development. The national rate was 72%. The Year 1 children again undertook the statutory phonics screening check in June. This assesses the children's ability to decode words using only their phonic knowledge and this year 93% of the children achieved the qualifying mark. The national rate was 83%. We are also pleased with our continuing high attainment at the end of Key Stage 1 (Year 2). The children achieved 77% in Reading and 82% in both Writing and Maths. This compares favourably with the national rates of 75%, 69% and 76% respectively.

2018 saw our third Year 6 cohort. This time 26 children sat the end of Key Stage 2 tests. Our overall combined reading, writing and mathematics result of 81% was significantly higher than the national figure of 64%. We are extremely proud of the results and the tremendously hard work of staff and children.

This year's School Development Plan (SDP) incorporates the Ofsted next steps for the school to enable us to achieve our School Aims and Vision. It sets objectives for improving teaching and learning, and considering standards of achievement and pupil well-being. The Headteacher and the Senior Leadership Team are regularly reporting progress of the plan at Committee and full Governors' meetings.

The agreed school priorities set are:

- 1. (Quality of Teaching, Learning and Assessment). For all teaching to be at least 'Good' with an increase in 'Outstanding' teaching throughout the year.
- 2. (Outcomes for pupils at the school). To raise the proportion of children meeting and exceeding age related expectations in writing across the school through continuing to develop the role of middle leaders in raising whole school standards.
- 3. (Quality of Leadership and Management). To enable children to feel safe to take risks and challenge themselves in order to reach their true potential.
- 4. (Quality of Leadership and Management) To develop the school's distinctive Christian vision so that it can be established and promoted by leadership at all levels to enable pupils and adults to flourish.

Our Christian values underpin our school culture and every half term we still focus on a different value. For the children this is mainly explored through Collective Worship, RE lessons and as part of the SEAL curriculum (Social and emotional aspects of learning). We inform the parents in the newsletter, encouraging the whole school community to focus on the value together. The staff think about how they can embody the value, when they discuss it at a staff meeting.

St. Mary's, along with all schools in Hertfordshire, have a new Herts Agreed Syllabus for the teaching of RE based on eight areas of learning: Beliefs and practices, Sources of wisdom, Symbols and actions, Prayer, worship and reflection, Identity and belonging, Ultimate

questions, Human responsibility and values, Justice and fairness. St. Mary's teachers have received training and implemented Religious Education material to assist with the teaching of Christianity called 'Understanding Christianity' and we have used this to enrich the RE curriculum that covers each of the eight areas of learning, alongside the other five main world faiths: Buddhism, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism and Sikhism.

Throughout its operation, the school promotes the fundamental British values including mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs. To enrich the curriculum, Miss Groves organises many exciting trips and activities for the children. This year the children have enjoyed numerous trips and visits to enrich their understanding of Christianity and other world religions, in addition to the regular church services and acts of Collective Worship run by Jonathan Gordon and David Russell from Northchurch Baptist Church.

St Mary's School continues to have one of the highest proportions of children who walk to school in the area.

The Smoult Trust has been most supportive to the school during the past year and has kindly provided funding to enable two children go on residential visits with their classes. We are very proud of what the children have achieved in sport and PE at St. Mary's and this will continue to be an area of focus and development for us.

Some of the many activities that have run this year have included (*free of charge);

- Sports Running Club*, Netball Club, Boogaloo Boogie, Cheerleading, Tennis Club, Cricket Club, Speed-stacking*
- Other Homework Club*, Maths Club*, Forest School*, Green Team, * Gardening Club*, Collective Worship*,
- Violin, Piano, Guitar, Recorder* and Ukulele* tuition and Choir*, Football Club, Netball Club, Girls' Football Club, Mini-Olympics, Rock Steady Music, Games Club* and Growth Mindset*, Yoga*

As ever, the School Association has worked very hard, raising money throughout the past year. Successful events included a Christmas Fair, Gatsby Evening and Auction, Parents' Quiz, Discos, Film Clubs, Easter Egg Competition, Photos by Carrie, Charity Match and Christmas Trees for Schools Scheme. They are funding Mother's Day flowers for every child, a contribution towards school trips for every class and have raised money to help the governors with a building project to upgrade the toilets in the top end of the school and also paid for the refurbishment of the infant toilets, electric gates at the front of the school and a new footpath.

We encourage the whole school community to support local and national charities and this year we have raised money for Children in Need, Sport Relief, The Bishop of St Albans Harvest Appeal, Homestart Dacorum, Hospice of St. Francis, Macmillan Cancer, Race for Life, Royal British Legion poppy appeal and Brain Tumour Research.

The wraparound child care continues to be very popular with our parents. This means that children can be looked after at Breakfast Club from 7.45 a.m. and remain in school at the

after-school club until collection at 6.00 p.m. Children who are not in full-time education are able to join our lunch club and then take part in Pre-School, before joining the older children after school for the club.

The annual music concerts in July were once again a highlight of the year. Children learning music within and outside school were given the chance to perform in two concerts, organised by Mrs Christie, with the kind help of Mr. and Mrs. Horton and Mrs. Osmond. In July, the KS2 production, "Dragon Days" was another highlight and included singing and acting of an exceptionally high standard.

We see music as an area to continue to develop at St Mary's. We have renegotiated our contract with the Herts Music Service, to include providing training for our teachers, to develop the quality of music provision in the classroom. We continue to offer peripatetic music lessons in violin, guitar and piano. The music service also runs a school choir (free of charge to parents), where the children are prepared for events during the year. They proudly performed in front of their families at the O2 Arena on the 31st January this year. St Mary's is a voluntary-aided (VA) maintained school. Maintained schools receive their running costs from central government via the local authority. In contrast to other types of maintained schools, only 90% of the capital costs of a VA school are met by the state. The foundation (in our case, the Governing Body), has to contribute the remaining 10% of the capital costs. Parents are encouraged to pay a voluntary contribution towards the school's maintenance funds in VA schools.

As we are a Church school the majority of the Governors are appointed by the PCC and the Diocese.

Our Chair since September 2018 is Alan Kemp and Owen Lewis is Vice Chair. The Governing Body has worked extremely hard throughout the past year, providing support and challenge, for which the school is extremely grateful.
